MESSAGE FROM THE CEO **New Programs & Services for Co-op Members**



Wow! I can't believe I am writing my April article. Where does the time go? As I write this, we are putting the final plans in place for the 2021 Annual Meeting. We will have election results in the May issue as well as prize winners and a list of the ten students who won scholarships.

But back to what's new and available now. I'm happy to report that the cooperative office has reopened to welcome members in to conduct business with us and protocols are in place to keep everyone healthy and safe.

WWVREMC and Hoosier Energy have been working together to update the energy efficiency rebates and incentives program to offer members new options in 2021. The new programs include an HVAC tune-up rebate and electric lawn equipment rebates. Members can receive a rebate of 50% off a qualifying HVAC tune-up cost (up to \$50). The HVAC tune-up rebate is available for your pre-season heating, ventilation and air conditioning equipment (HVAC) check-up with a licensed HVAC contractor to ensure your system is operating efficiently. A rebate for mini-split single room installations has also been added to the HVAC incentives

We now offer rebates on electric lawnmowers, leaf blowers and string trimmers - up to \$50 towards the cost of new equipment. The brand you choose is up to you, as well as where you make the purchase.

You may recall that the cooperative began exploring the use of electric vehicles in 2020. We are excited to roll out Cooperative Charge. This program is for our members who are interested in purchasing or leasing a fully electric vehicle, also known as an EV. As part of the program, members can receive a Level 2 residential EV

charger at no cost. Installation and maintenance costs are not included. Data from the electric vehicle charger will be used to better design future EV programs. We have a limited number of free chargers that will be offered on a first come, first served basis.

The Rural Energy Audit Program is back for our farm and rural businesses. This program was a pilot a couple of years ago and WWVREMC and Hoosier Energy have teamed up once again to offer this program to improve efficiencies for our rural business accounts.

And when you visit our website, you will notice a new look! We have been hard at work building a new site with new features to better serve you. We are in the final weeks of editing and auditing the site and plan to launch the new website this spring.

Finally, I will end with two new member support initiatives. First, we are testing a chat feature on our website to gauge the ease of use for members to communicate with us during office hours. This new feature will be tested using different vendors to fit our budget and software compatibility. We will keep you updated on our progress.

And the second initiative you may have noticed on your past couple of bills is a new pay option. Transactions are made through VanillaDirect with many locations throughout the cooperative's service territory. Members may visit our website, or vanilladirect.com for payment locations and information.

As you can see, we have been very busy here at the cooperative. By the time you receive this newsletter, we will have held the 2021 annual meeting, conducted the election of directors and nominating committee members, and rolled out several new programs and services. All in the first quarter of 2021. Whew!

ROUND UP GRANTS IN 2020 Last

year, the WWVREMC Community Trust, Inc. granted \$28,010 in assistance to local organizations. A total of \$569,921 has been awarded since the beginning of the program. The current monthly income to the program is just under \$2,200, with about 38% of WWVREMC members contributing to the Trust every month. In addition to monthly contributions from the members who "roundup" their bills, the Trust receives one-time donations from individuals throughout the year. Over \$2,100 was pledged in one-time donations and capital credits donated back to Operation Round Up® during our fall membership campaign. We appreciate the generosity of each donation made to the program. Thank you.

21st Century Energy Taskforce: Findings and Conclusions

HOW WILL THE 21ST CENTURY ENERGY TASK FORCE REPORT AFFECT YOU?

In 2019, the Indiana Legislature asked the 21st Century Energy Task Force to examine the state's policies regarding electric generation portfolios and how shifting to renewable energies could impact the reliability, affordability and resilience of electric utility service. Other Task Force assignments:

- Evaluate state regulators' role in protecting consumer interests
- Investigate how possible changes in generation portfolios could impact the state

After a year and a half of examination, the Task Force released 17 findings and eight recommendations for the General Assembly to consider. Here's what that means for you, your community and your cooperative:

• The Task Force recommended the General Assembly, the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission and utility companies work together to reduce Indiana's average electric rates. The goal: to ensure Indiana's rates are among the lowest 25% of all states by the end of 2030. Your electric cooperative is committed to keeping energy safe, reliable and affordable for you. With more research and support from policymakers, electric co-ops have even more tools to work toward those goals.

- To ensure Indiana can continue to attract and retain businesses and maintain solid economic growth, we must carefully adopt renewable energy sources. Renewable energy sources reduce carbon emissions, are presently economically competitive, and offer new opportunities for Indiana to attract new investment, jobs and infrastructure that grow local economies. Electric cooperatives invest in your community and are focused on keeping energy reliable and affordable. Many cooperatives already utilize renewable energy sources and seek new opportunities to facilitate economic growth. With additional support from the Legislature, cooperatives will be even more empowered to support renewable energy sources when it is appropriate and when it ultimately benefits you, their members.
- Renewable energy comes with risks that must be considered

and precautions that must be taken. Electricity generated from renewable energy sources is significantly more unpredictable than electricity generated from other resources because of its dependence of forces of nature (i.e. wind, sun, water). To keep electricity reliable and constant, power systems require different resources to compensate for the unpredictability of renewable sources.

Your electric cooperative has your best interests at heart: keeping your lights on and your costs low. Cooperatives consistently evaluate their electric portfolio and seek ways to improve your electricity's safety, reliability and affordability. They will continue to do so alongside the Indiana General Assembly as more renewable energy sources are gradually integrated into the power supply.

As more research is done on renewable energy and electric generation in Indiana, your cooperative will continue to advocate for your best interests at the state and federal level.
