The due dates for payment of electric bills are **June 19** and **26**.

Jodie Creek, our board secretary/treasurer, joined me in April on a trip to our nation's capital. We joined 72 Indiana electric cooperative leaders from 26 cooperatives and over 1,200 from across the nation to talk with our Indiana State delegation about issues important to our cooperatives

and push for policies that ensure reliable, affordable electricity for rural America.

Number one on the list is reliability and our opposition to the Environmental Protection Agency's new power plant rule, which was released the day after we returned home.

Our ask is to oppose this rule that puts "the cart before the horse" and demands resource changes before the technology is viable and ready for change. We are not against change, but it must be well thought out and planned to coincide with goals for reliability and affordability. Our resource capacity is already strained in high-demand times during the winter and the summer. These proposed changes have caused cooperative energy leaders to worry about maintaining our most important goal of keeping the lights on 24/7, 365 days per year.

As part of the largest infrastructure investment since the Rural Electrification Act in 1936, Congress included a provision for funding from the bipartisan infrastructure law and the Inflation Reduction Act that created the Empowering Rural America (New ERA) program. We talked to our elected officials about maintaining these financial resources available exclusively to electric cooperatives for innovation and adopting new technologies to move resource portfolios toward a well-balanced portfolio. The New ERA program has \$9.7 billion available specifically for cooperatives. The

cooperative network has embraced this opportunity by turning in applications totaling over \$46 billion in projects. Locally, we applied, and so did our G&T, Hoosier Energy. Whether anything comes of our application has yet to be seen, but Hoosier Energy has moved forward to the next step. We all look forward to the opportunity and the outcome of successful projects that will be valuable to our members and will be a learning opportunity for our industry. Our ask on this front was that these program dollars remain available and are not reduced.

Members of our delegation were also asked to be aware of any attempts to put legislation in place that would harm our local ability to manage pole contacts. As many large providers look to build in our territory, we need to retain our local control over scheduling any needed pole contacts and pole replacements to accommodate their building of broadband to our members. Large for-profit companies would like to standardize costs and minimize their expenses by putting specific rules in place with limits different from our locally designed procedures and costs. We are opposed to this because it can cost our members money in this process. To date, we have worked well with these companies, but that hasn't been true everywhere, so we joined with our sister cooperatives to bring this message to legislators.

While in D.C., we were able to meet with eight different Indiana legislative offices, and our messages were well received. We will continue to build relationships and have conversations with our state and federal legislators to keep our concerns fresh in their minds, but we also encourage you to do the same. Make your voice heard at action.indianaec.org. This website allows you to sign up to find your legislators and connect with them to share your views. That personal relationship is important, and we have found success in maintaining those relationships. We encourage you to do the same and be a voice with and for your co-op.


