over the next few months, we want to inform you about a range of energy-saving offerings designed specifically for you. You can manage your summer energy consumption and costs by taking advantage of these programs and services.

Time of Use Rate

Did you know WWVREMC offers a Time of Use (TOU) Rate? This rate allows you to lower your energy bills by shifting your electricity usage to times of lower demand, known as off-peak hours. By adjusting your electric usage to align with these off-peak times, WWVREMC can avoid peak demand charges and pass those savings on to you. While you can use your appliances at any time, it's advisable to avoid running large appliances during peak hours for maximum savings. With some planning, you can take advantage of the lower rates available during off-peak times. Contact our office for more information or to calculate your potential savings.

Budget Billing

When you sign up for WWVREMC's budget billing plan, your energy bill is calculated by averaging your previous 12 months of usage. With this type of levelized billing, your monthly energy costs are easier to budget and manage, especially during seasonal fluctuations when bills tend to increase based on the weather. Budget billing is a great option for anyone with a fixed income or highly variable seasonal needs.

Rebate Program

When you make upgrades or purchases to improve your home's energy efficiency, you should be rewarded for

those smart choices. WWVREMC offers rebates on various residential HVAC systems, including heat pumps, mini-split heat pumps, and geothermal systems. We also provide rebates for HVAC tune-ups, heat pump water heaters, Wi-Fi-enabled water heaters, and electric outdoor equipment. You Have the Power

Small actions combined can have a big impact on summer energy bills. The best way to lower energy usage during summer months is to raise the thermostat to the highest setting that's comfortable. Ceiling fans can also help you feel cooler, but remember to turn them off when you leave the room. In the heat of the day, close the drapes on south and west-facing windows to block the heat coming through the glass. On warm summer nights, fire up the grill to keep additional heat out of the kitchen. Do you have a pool? Pool pumps use quite a bit of electricity. Once you have your pool open and the water clear, use a timer on the pump to control how many hours per day the pump runs. Remember to change air filters often so your cooling system doesn't have to work harder than necessary, and as mentioned earlier, this would be a way to receive a rebate from us by getting a tune-up on your system.

High energy bills shouldn't dampen your summer fun. At WWVREMC, we are committed to helping you manage your energy consumption effectively. The hidden account number is 91196602. One way to save money is by taking advantage of our various rebate programs throughout the year. We also recommend downloading our free SmartHub app, which lets you easily track your energy usage from your computer or smartphone. Young WWVREMC members (ages 4-13) are invited to participate in our Spring Flower Vase coloring contest for a chance to win a family pass to the zoo!


To enter, color the vase and create your bouquet of flowers to fill it. Once finished, send in your colored page by June 13, 2025.
