As we celebrate National Farm Safety Week this September, it's an important reminder of safety in agriculture. We are deeply thankful for our farmers' hard work, dedication, and resilience. Your commitment feeds our

communities and sustains our way of life.

Farming is one of the most rewarding yet dangerous jobs in the world. Among the hazards are overhead power lines, which pose a significant risk to operators of tall or extendable equipment.

Every year, dozens of farmers are injured or killed when tractors or tall equipment come into contact with power lines. Tractor-related incidents — including overturns, runovers, entanglements, and collisions — claim around 250 lives annually in the U.S.

Raised loader arms, augers, and other tall attachments can easily reach overhead lines. Without direct contact, electricity can arc, jumping from the line to the equipment. If your tractor touches a power line, the entire machine can become energized, creating a deadly hazard.

If this occurs, stay inside the cab unless there is an immediate fire. Call 911 and warn others to stay away, as the ground around your equipment may also be energized. Stepping out could create a path for electricity to travel through your body, resulting in electrocution.

If a fire forces you to evacuate, jump clear — never touch the machine and the ground at the same time. Land with both feet together and shuffle away, keeping your feet close together to minimize risk.

Always identify overhead lines before starting work to prevent accidents and maintain at least 10 feet of clearance. Lower the augers, arms, and attachments before moving. Use a spotter when working near powerlines and install Rollover Protective Structures (ROPS), which can reduce fatalities by over 70%. Stay alert, as fatigue and distractions can increase the risk of accidents.

Electricity may be invisible, but its dangers are very real. You can protect yourself and your farm by staying aware and following essential protocols. Always respect the power of electricity. At WWVREMC, we prioritize your well-being and are committed to sharing important information for the agricultural community. FLY DRONES WITH CAUTION TO AVOID ELECTRICAL ISSUES



Don't fly drones anywhere near power lines or electrical substations.

If your drone gets caught in power lines or crashes into a utility pole or substation, never attempt to retrieve it yourself. Entering a substation is criminal trespassing and is an electrocution danger. Call the electric cooperative or other utility for help.

Don't touch a downed line or anything it has fallen on, such as a fence or a tree limb.

Keep a safe distance from downed lines and tell others to do the same.

Call 911 to notify emergency personnel and the utility immediately if you see downed power lines.

Follow federal or state guidelines for registering your drone or getting business approval.
