As we gather with family and friends to celebrate the holiday season, all of us at Whitewater Valley REMC want to express our gratitude for the trust and support of our members. Your cooperative family is always working behind the scenes to keep your lights glowing safely, reliably, and at the

lowest possible cost — especially during this special time of year.

One of the essential tools that helps us do that is something called a Cost of Service Study (COSS). While it might not sound as festive as twinkling lights or holiday cookies, it plays a significant role in ensuring fairness and reliability for every member.

What is a Cost of Service Study?

A Cost of Service Study is a detailed look at what it truly costs our cooperative to deliver electricity to homes, farms, and businesses. It examines every part of our operation — maintaining poles and wires, increasing material costs, cost of restoring power after winter storms, and more.

As a member-owned cooperative, we have no outside shareholders to pay. Every dollar we collect is reinvested into operating and improving our electric system. The COSS helps ensure that the way we collect those dollars through rates aligns with the actual cost of serving each type of member.

Why We Do It

Just as the holidays remind us of the importance of fairness and community, those same values guide our cooperative year-round. We want to make sure that:

- Each group of members (residential, commercial, large power users, etc.) pays only their fair share.
- Rates remain stable and predictable no surprises under the tree.
- The co-op remains financially strong so we can keep investing in reliability, safety, and future technologies.

How the Study Works

The Cost of Service Study looks at:

- Expenses Everything it takes to deliver power, from maintenance to customer service.
- Usage Patterns When and how members use electricity throughout the day and year.
- Cost Allocation Dividing costs fairly among different types of members based on their impact on the system.

Once the study is complete, our board of directors reviews the results and uses them to guide future rate adjustments and system improvements.

What It Means for You

The COSS doesn't automatically mean rates will change, but it ensures that if they do, those changes are based on real data and fairness — not guesswork. This helps us keep your electricity safe, reliable, and affordable, no matter the season.

Our Commitment to You

Transparency, fairness, and community are at the heart of everything we do — especially during the holidays. We want you to know where your money goes and how your cooperative makes decisions. The Cost of Service Study is just one of the ways we're working to keep our system fair, balanced, and ready for the future.

WWVREMC Announces \$491,115 in Capital Credit Retirement

As a not-for-profit electric cooperative, WWVREMC believes in giving credit where it is due-to the members who make our co-op strong. Because we operate at cost, any excess revenue is returned to you, not outside investors. This year, your Board of Directors is pleased to announce the retirement of \$491,000 in capital credits, which will be disbursed around Dec. 16.

Here's how it works: When you use electricity and pay your monthly bill, we track your usage with the co-op. After covering operating expenses, any remaining revenue is allocated as capital credits. When finances allow, the board votes to return those credits to members either by check or as a bill credit if the amount is under \$10. Capital credits are just one of the many benefits of co-op membership and a key reason why cooperatives stand apart: we give back to our members, not outside parties.
